The Expanding Dementia Care Support in Underserved Communities and Populations in Michigan

The AAA and Michigan State University School of Social Work are partnering on a \$333,096 Michigan Health Endowment Fund grant to pilot a two-year grant program. Currently, about 190,000 people are living with dementia in Michigan.

The purpose of the grant is to expand dementia resources to rural areas and minority groups and provide two social work services to Dementia Caregivers with two main focus areas:

1. General Case Management: This will provide information, education, and linkage to services. 2. Clinical: Which will provide counseling for the family caregivers.



Public access points such as libraries, laundromats, 24-hour gas stations, food pantries and soup kitchens, reported to the volunteers individuals that would frequent their establishments seeking warmth from the winter weather.

Volunteers were able to engage with 164 homeless individuals. One hundred and eleven were sheltered and 53 were unsheltered. The volunteers collected count information to present to HUD and state partners and provided the unhoused with outreach bags containing supplies such as water, gloves, socks, non-perishable snacks, hand warmers and community resources.

Not only did Mr. Ladd deliver to our homebound residents throughout losco County, he also gave our team a helping hand for our Oscoda distribution. This distribution usually runs 30 minutes, but we saw a large increase in participants, lengthening the distribution to over one hour!







Weatherization Assistance Program

The NEMCSA Weatherization Team is one step closer to starting work with MSHDA and their new MI-Hope Grant. This has been a challenging road for both NEMCSA and MSHDA since they are developing much of the administrative structure for this large grant as we are trying to move forward with our projects. We wanted to thank everyone within NEMCSA who was part of the process and helped us get to this point. Our first allocation is for \$200,000 and those funds are earmarked to dovetail with our WAP funds to make homes in our region weatherization ready. We will be looking to complete major projects on homes that were deferred from the WAP for various reasons, the main issue being roof replacements. We hope to begin many of these projects as soon as spring weather arrives, which we all hope is sooner rather than later. Once a percentage of the first allocation is spent, a second round of \$200,000 will be added to our efforts to improve the housing for qualified families in our service region.

Another BOSS family welcomed a baby into their family!

The BOSS program was able to fund the purchase of a used vehicle for a family who was in critical need due to their vehicle having rust and frame failure that it was deemed not road worthy or worth it to repair. This direct service assistance prevented the mother of the family from losing her job, and allowed her to have safe transportation for her and her family!
