

Homeless & Prevention

Michigan Communities Conference last
month.

The scope of the conference was to address the housing crisis across the state of Michigan. It was the first time the conference has been in-person since the pandemic. Michigan is nearly 190,000 housing units short across the state right now; housing is expensive. Staff attended the home buyer courses learning homeownership is far out of reach for more and more Michigan families. In the last 10 years, cost of single-family homes has gone up 84% while income has only gone up by 25%. Staff connected with regional housing partners to discuss the tasks needed to address the first ever statewide housing plan which is the foundation of creating a successful housing ecosystem.



Congratulations to 2023 Michigan Community Action Award Winner, Whitney. Her supportive advocate, Traci Schuelke, has guided Whitney in completing her GED, obtaining full-time employment, enrolled in college and has obtained childcare for her 2-year-old daughter.

Building Michigan Communities Conference

This month staff attended the Building Michigan Communities Conference in Lansing. This is an annual conference that covers different topics and expands on ways to grow communities. Staff attended a number of break out sessions and were able to network with professionals from around the state. Staff discovered new ways to expand current programs and create new partnerships to allow the programs to continue to grow and thrive within our communities.

Rental Counseling

Staff continue to meet with individuals that are looking to become renters or are new to renting. In each counseling session, participants discuss their housing goals, create a budget, review their credit report and create a plan for how to achieve their housing goals. Program staff have partnered with Housing staff to meet with each of their participants so that they have a more in depth look at their finances and housing goals. and everyone can work together to make sure the individual doesn't return to homelessness. Programs that are funded through HUD are required to utilize a **HUD Certified Housing Counselor to assist participants** with budgeting and money management. Having staff certified as HUD Housing Counselors has put the agency in a great place to be able to assist individuals within our communities.

Weatherization

The NEMCSA Weatherization Team is busy wrapping up the regular DOE funding program year that ends June 30th. We are on track to meet our production goal of 58 homes completed and will spend out the entire fund, which is great news!

The new program year does bring a slight increase in funds and a higher average cost per home, which is good news for clients and their families. This should allow the program to increase energy saving measures installed in each home. We also received some excellent news related to LIHEAP funds. a second increase in allocation was announced late. last month and an additional \$30,000 will be added to the program. This is on top of the first reallocation announced in April, which basically double the initial allocation of funds. LIHEAP is used to help balance the average cost per home and this funding is more flexible than DOE allocations. That translates to a more complete package of measures installed for our clients. An example of this flexibility can be seen in replacing unsafe cooking appliances, primarily gas ranges, that produce large amounts of carbon monoxide, which can make people ill over time. A great use of these funds to help keep clients safe in their homes.

A BIG congratulations to three BOSS families that received 2023 Client Community action awards from Michigan Community Action Agency in May!

As the first year of the pilot program is coming to an end, program staff are reflecting on the lessons learned and successes.

A lesson learned to improve transition periods: Adopt a tiered approach to allow intensive case management support to transition gradually to an as needed support. This method encompasses a participant centered care approach by ensuring that support is continued in a manner that best supports the participant.

Successes: Six families have received life coaching sessions, intensive case management support, referrals to other services and direct service assistance. In addition, four families have reported improvement of financial well being and have transitioned to as needed support due to successful accomplishments towards their goal of self-sufficiency!
