### **Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program Update**

Thanks to additional funding from the Administration for Community Living, the Ombudsman Program was able to purchase comfort items for Adult Foster Care (AFC) and Homes for the Aged residents in Region 9's counties. Items included a blanket, Chapstick, hand lotion and a calendar among several other items. The staff added these items to wheelchair/walker bags that conveniently hang from these devices. The distribution has already begun and the residents receiving these items are incredibly grateful for the items. Pictured here is an AFC resident with one of the staff. In October, Region 9's two local Ombudsman attended a training session in Frankenmuth with Ombudsman from around the state. One of the presentations was by the Michigan Dept. of Attorney General's Health Care Fraud Division and what their division can do for residents when a complaint has been received.





Those who collect retirement, disability, survivor and dependent benefits will see a 2.8% increase to their monthly benefit in 2026. On average, that means a \$56 increase based on a \$2,000 monthly benefit. The Medicare Part B premium is expected to rise by 11.6% to \$206.50, and the annual deductible is projected to increase by 12% to \$288.

NEMCSA recently had the pleasure of welcoming representatives from the Michigan Department of Lifelong Education, Advancement, and Potential (MiLEAP) to our Alpena offices and Sunset Head Start/GSRP classrooms. During their visit, MiLEAP leaders learned more about NEMCSA's comprehensive early childhood programs and the vital role they play in supporting children and families across our service area. Our visitors observed Pre-K classrooms in action and learned about local successes and challenges, NEMCSA's innovative services, including School Success, Child Care Back Office, and the BOSS program. This visit was an excellent opportunity to strengthen our collaboration with one of our most significant partners at the state level. Together, NEMCSA and MiLEAP continue working toward the shared goal of ensuring that every Michigan child has access to high-quality early learning experiences that prepare them for lifelong success.



### **Health Event with Community Partners!**

An event coordinated by the Early Childhood Health Specialist, Board Member Lyn Behnke, and U of M Flint Professor Christina Snyder, had 23 children in attendance who received 41 health services! Services provided were in collaboration between 12 U of M Flint Nurse Practitioner students, NEMCSA Registered Dietician Janet Malusi, EHS Nurse Jeanette Moran, Wellvance, and Alcona Health Center. Several parents relayed how they love coming to events like this as it is a one-stop-shop and saves them from needing to take multiple days off work.

### New NEMCSA Early Childhood Centers Opening in Deckerville, Port Huron & West Branch!

We're excited to be expand access to early learning with new preschool sites open in Deckerville and West Branch, bringing more opportunities for children and families to grow! At the same time, we're busy onboarding staff in St. Clair County, our newest addition to the NEMCSA service area. With 14 Head Start and Early Head Start classrooms currently moving through the licensing process, we can't

wait to open the doors and welcome families soon!

## BOSS Program Success Stories

The BOSS Program continues to support transformative progress across Northeast Michigan. This past month, there were several inspiring participant achievements:

- A participant began a new full-time role as a mobile home health care worker earning \$19/hour, while another secured a better-paying position to advance her career.
- Multiple participants have started college programs, including Pharmacy Tech, while another completed her Medical Coding certification, demonstrating continued investment in their futures.
- Several families achieved new levels of financial and housing stability, including purchasing vehicles, moving into more affordable housing, and developing payment plans to manage debt responsibly.
- A participant completed her resilience course.
- Two participants from the same household both obtained full-time employment, and others began parttime roles that align with their family needs.
- Two BOSS families participated in the Pantry Preparedness group session with Leisa Sutton from Suttons Daze, who is also a NEMCSA board member (Thank you Leisa!!) gaining practical skills for food security and receiving copies of the presenter's published book to continue learning at home.
- BOSS Program Graduate in Sept!

In 2023, Alpena County's food insecurity rate was nearly triple the statewide average—a sobering reminder of the challenges many families in our community face. ### **Housing Pathways for Young Adults**

In September our Youth and Young Adult Coordinator and Financial Sustainability Coordinator met with the students involved in the PIVOT program to discuss our Youth and Young Adult Housing program and budgeting services.

### Homelessness Awareness Month

October marks a busy and transitional time for Housing staff as we close out the fiscal year and begin planning for the year ahead. It's also when planning for Homeless Awareness Month reaches full speed. This year's theme is "Speak Up. Speak Out. End the Criminalization of Homelessness" highlighting a critical issue: sleeping in places not meant for human habitation is often a last resort when there is no access to affordable housing or shelter bed availability. To support our unhoused neighbors and those transitioning into new housing, Housing staff are organizing a supply drive. Over 40 drop box locations are available. Monetary donations are also being accepted to fill any remaining gaps. Please see the flyer for the items needed. A second flyer with drop-off locations will be released soon.

On 10/15, Street Outreach Specialist, Chad spoke on WATZ's Mid-Day Spotlight to share about Homeless Awareness Month efforts and all the great things the team

are doing in the community.

During the month of October, 10 households have been enrolled in the Shelter Diversion program, and 5 of those households have been successfully diverted. So far this month, we have utilized \$700 towards diversion, but most households were able to be diverted with other resources. These funds have helped reach those who are at imminent risk of homelessness by forming a bridge to help before they lose their night-time residence. Having flexible funding available, it has been tremendously helpful with mediation to those doubled up. Most were able to avoid entering an emergency shelter while receiving housing navigation services. In addition, they were able to obtain items and other assistance that could be difficult with other funding guidelines.



In October our Youth Advisory Board visited our office to host a listening session with our participants. This was an opportunity for our youth to share their stories and experiences while involved in our Housing Pathways for Young Adults Program. They were provided pizza for lunch and each received a \$75 incentive for attending.

## FINANCIAL EMPOWERMENT

### **Housing Counseling**

In September & October, seven participants completed Homebuyer Education and Pre-Purchase Counseling. Four of those participants have already been pre-approved for a mortgage and will be purchasing a home within the next three months. The other participant is actively working with our Financial Sustainability Coordinator to reduce their debts so that they're able to reduce their debt-to-income ratio and increase their credit score.

### **Family Self-Sufficiency Program**

The family self-sufficiency program currently has nineteen participants. In October, we had one household graduate, they had amassed an escrow of over \$3,000 that they plan to use to pay off debts, so they are able to move towards homeownership. Ashley, our Financial Sustainability Coordinator is actively working with MSHDA representatives to increase our case load to be able to better assist families in our communities to reach self-sufficiency.

## PROGRAM BRINGS LIFE CHANGING SERVICE TO WENDY'S HOME

When Wendy learned about Weatherization, she hoped it might make her home more comfortable and energy efficient. What she received was beyond her expectations. Contractors and Weatherization staff worked diligently to upgrade her furnace, water heater, insulation, doors, and electrical panel. Wendy raves about the improvements to her furnace, which is only six years old, but never worked properly prior

to Weatherization's involvement. She praises the upgrade in insulation and electrical work, calling it

"incredible" and speaks very highly about the professionalism of the staff and contractors. Wendy says, "the work and cleanup were very professional, the contractors knew what they were doing and got the job done." When she signed up for the program, she said she didn't expect to hear back as she knew there was a long waitlist and a lot of client interest. Wendy says, "I am so so grateful for everything... it is so appreciated." She reports more than \$28,000 in home energy upgrades were completed, which adds value, addresses long-term safety, and increases energy-efficiency and comfort. Wendy's closing statement about the program was, "it is a really wonderful program for low-income people to have this kind of assistance. They did more than Weatherization." Wendy's story is one of many showing how the Weatherization Assistance Program

helps households improve overall quality of life. We are proud to see the positive impact this program has on our community, one house at a time.

## FGP/SCP VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

Carrying On: Impact from Foster Grandparent & Senior Companion Volunteers Will Continue!







On August 28th, FGP/SCP Project Director, Heidi Powers, was notified the Trump Administration's Office of Management Budget (OMB) will release funding previously impounded by the Administration for renewal projects. The decision to fund AmeriCorps Seniors Foster Grandparent (FGP) and Senior Companion (SCP) renewal grants by OMB followed litigation filed by 23 State Attorney Generals, including Michigan, and two Governors and an immense advocacy campaign completed by many including our own volunteers. Prior to this unexpected news, both programs were slated for permanent closure September 30th with Foster Grandparent effective July 18th and Senior Companions September 13th. We received the official Notice of Grant Awards on September 10th at which time Heidi began calling all volunteers and station staff personally to share the news. Making the calls and hearing the joy and relief from the volunteers, teachers, station partners was incredibly heartwarming. True "goosebump moments" with everyone contacted and pure joy. Our Grandparents are back in school and Senior Companions continuing to provide friendship and companionship to their clients. Now the work begins to rebuild the programs and come back stronger. We will be hiring new staff and going on a volunteer recruiting binge to make up for very valuable time lost following months of uncertainty.
