**Re-Entry Simulation** 



H& P staff attended a Community Re-entry Simulation to gain a better understanding of the obstacles faced by individuals newly released from incarceration and returning to their communities. The simulation offered a hands-on experience for participants and volunteers who were given a "life scenario" which included a felony charge, stipulations for parole, and various other wild card events. After the timed, 4-week households enrolled in the Rapid Rehousing Program simulation spanning across 2 hours, the group gathered for a panel and open discussion on what was learned. H& P staff volunteered their thoughts on the importance of agency awareness, mental health, and interagency communication to help relieve some barriers to housing and other supports faced by newly released individuals and their families.

Nine months ago, Kathy found herself homeless and pregnant, living on the streets or in a car. Her homelessness was sporadic since 16 years old. She had not had a place to call home in over 10 years. She found a spot at River House and was provided housing resources. With the help of NEMCSA's Permanent Supportive Housing program, Kathy was able to apply for a Stability Voucher. Through PSH's collaboration with Tip of the Mitt, Kathy was leased up on a Stability Voucher. Many agencies have put their resources together to help on the road to stability; those agencies include WIC, DHHS, Child Protection Council of Crawford/ Roscommon County. On March 7th, 2025, Kathy welcomed a happy, healthy baby boy, Andrew. The road to stability continues, but not without the help of PSH and its partners.


**ALERT!** Housing Pathways for Young Adults

In the month of March, the program established their first Transitional Housing unit and have a single male housed in the unit. Staff were able to purchase him a futon, air fryer, bedding, cleaning supplies, several other household items and groceries. There are still 2 who are working on obtaining income, food stamps and reaching personal goals. There are 4 literally homeless households staff are helping complete housing applications, providing resources for employment and helping obtain ID documents. The program is in the process of gaining their second Transitional Housing unit and should have a single adult housed there soon!

In the month of March, Housing Intake staff met with the homeless shelters in the region to explain program process, train on coordinated entry, and go over any program updates. The access committee has moved monthly meetings to bi-monthly as the group feels we all have strong and efficient access points for our community members. There were 5 motel placements and a total of \$3844.25 spent.

# FINANCIAL EMPOWERMENT

#### **Housing Counseling**

With the funding allocated to help stop property tax foreclosures, NEMCSA's Financial Coach was successfully able to assist 26 households with avoiding foreclosure and assist them with learning to manage their finances so they're able to budget their money moving forward to maintain their housing without facing potential foreclosure in the future.

In the month of March, the Financial Coach worked with 5 households that are working with Nicolet Bank to complete Homebuyer Education and Pre-Purchase counseling, so they are able to access MSHDA mortgages and the different down payment programs they have available to become homeowners.

#### **Family Self-Sufficiency Program**

There are currently 24 participants in the Family Self-Sufficiency Program. The Financial Coach is actively working with 2 participants that are in the process of purchasing homes and will graduate within the next coming months.

She always participates in monthly in-service meetings, asks insightful questions and seeks clarification when needed, and demonstrates all the best qualities of a Senior Companion volunteer. Kris has been volunteering 30 hours a week for six years and was referred to the program by another Senior Companion.
