Looking Back

50 years ago Aug. 17, 1972

Although three of Alpena's five Catholic schools are closed this year, two of the buildings will continue to be used extensively as parish and religious education centers. The St. Bernard Parish Council voted Wednesday night to rent a maximum of four second-floor classrooms to NEMCA (NorthEast Michigan Community Action) for second-floor classrooms for use in the Headstart Day Care Program. The rental will run from 12 months beginning Sept. 1 and will include use of the classrooms for a maximum of eight

hours per day.

100 years ago Aug. 17, 1922

Stony Point Park _ That Stony Point Park is more and more becoming a notable point of the city as well as northern Michigan, is quite evident from the number of tourist who have located at the point and are making use of the camping grounds. At present about fifteen tents are located on the grounds. The point is not only being used for temporary camping grounds, but Alpena bathers are enjoying the beach.

Welcome to the 2022-2023 School Year

Full-time staff were welcomed back August 15 with messages on connection, resilience, and keeping a positive mindset. Utilizing both virtual and in-person meeting formats enabled staff to spend more of their time on-site. During his presentation, our speaker asked the following questions:

Along with every other industry, we face significant challenges this year.

Despite the challenges, we continue to focus on providing high-quality services for young children and their families. The foundation of Head Start and GSRP is our connected and productive workforce working together with parents to ensure the best possible future for our nation's children.

Extra funds were used to call back both fulltime and part-staff earlier than usual, providing more time to prepare for the school year and an additional week's wages.

Beginning-of-the-year celebrations were held to welcome back staff and start the school year as a strong team.



PROGRAM IMPACT

The School Success Partnership application and budget for the \$1.525 million in state funding has been submitted and approved! The state funding is 52% of the \$2.9 million total SSP budget. Additional funding for SSP is 38% School Partnerships, NEMCSA 7% and Other Funding 3%.

NEMCSA Food Programs have been expanding their reach with the home delivery program thanks to a combined partnership with NEMCSA's Volunteer Services Department and the amazing volunteers that have signed up to assist with this effort. In the month of July & August, 58 boxes of food were delivered. In addition, 25 boxes of food were delivered to our community partner, Hope Shores Alliance, for their survivors at their various locations.

Going along with our home delivery program our Food Program was awarded \$25,000 from a Reach and Resiliency grant to be utilized for mileage reimbursement for our volunteers!

Sherry was briefed on the situation and jumped into action, delivering cases and gallons of water to Ms. Lafby. Other community partners are supporting Ms. Lafby with grants and other resources to repair her well. This is an excellent example of teamwork through multiple departments and agencies!

Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP)

The new DOE program year is beginning to ramp up and our LIHEAP FY22 is winding down, so it is very busy time in weatherization. We are still in a holding pattern as we wait for details on the new Bi-Partisan Infrastructure funding. The State of Michigan is expecting the funds to be available early this fall and we have a statewide meeting later this month to hear more about the process. Our Team is working hard as we have implemented a new strategy to help educate our clients about the program while also trying to boost the number of completed applications we receive. Thank you to Kristen Thoman, who is spearheading this new process and actually meeting in the client's home to walk them through the relatively complicated application process, while at the same time providing them with a good understanding of what to expect as the process moves along. Since implementing this new strategy, we have secured all but one application that was ready for approval. We look forward to continuing this crucial new process to even more success.





We recently had a chance to visit our shell contractor on site as they were completing a weatherization project. Bayview Insulation is a long-time contractor in our program and without their expertise and commitment to our program, we would be struggling to meet the State production goals as many other agencies around the network are. We appreciate all they do for our program and our community!

The BOSS mentors, Traci Schuekle, Robyn Hart, Brooke Mainville & Amanda Bergeron are currently empowering a total of five families, and all are seeing great improvements. Each mentor will be with their family for a total of two years.

NEMCSA's new pilot program, BOSS (Bridges of Self-Sufficiency) is off to an amazing start. Our mentors have adopted NASA's "Failure is not an option" mindset with their empowerment case management support styles to their participants and it has shown. Region 9 AAA hosted a free **Matter of Balance Lay Leader Training** on August 29th and September 1st. Seven new leaders were trained from five counties (losco, Montmorency, Roscommon, Ogemaw, and Otsego).

Matter of Balance is an eight two-hour small group workshop led by a trained leader that helps older adults who are concerned about falls; have had falls in the past or are interested in improving flexibility, balance, and strength. Workshops are designed to reduce the fear of falling and increase activity levels among older adults. Region 9 AAA provides workshops throughout the twelve-county region.

Elder Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation Prevention Webinar Series

Region 9 Area Agency on Aging hosted three virtual Elder Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation Prevention Webinars that were held via zoom. A total of 26 participants attended the webinars. The topics covered included Challenging Perceptions: Sexual Violence in Later Life, Basics of Elder Abuse, and Basics of Reporting Elder Abuse. Participants walked away with a better understanding of the types of Elder Abuse, warning signs of Elder Abuse, what makes a person vulnerable to abuse and how and where to report. These webinars would not be possible without help from our partners: Hope Shores Alliance, Michigan Long Term Care Ombudsman Program/ Michigan Elder Justice Initiative and Adult Protective Services.
