


8 Ways to Help Aging Seniors During the Holidays

If you're looking to give back this holiday season, helping your aging seniors is a great place to start! The holidays can be the most wonderful time of year but many struggle during this time of year. Holidays can be hard on aging adults especially if they are dealing with grief, live alone, have mobility issues or are unable to see their families.

- Check in Don't forget about your aging neighbors or loved ones. Visiting can do wonders during the holidays.
- 2. Asist in the shopping Offer to take them shopping, shop for them, or help them shop online.
- Help decorate Offer to set up their tree, unpack ornaments, or add lights to their windows.

Medicare Open Enrollement

One of the great things about Medicare is that beneficiaries can evaluate drug costs for 2024 and change their Part D drug plan during the annual Open Enrollment periods to save money. From October 15 through December 7, enrollees can review their Part D prescription plan and choose a new plan to start January 1. Then starting January 1 through March 31, Open Enrollment begins for Medicare Advantage Plans (HMOs and PPOs with drug coverage). This is where beneficiaries can review up to 52 Advantage plans made available throughout Region 9 counties and compare healthcare costs, prescription costs, and extra benefits. To assist beneficiaries with this process the Michigan Medicare Assistance Program (MMAP) has certified counselors available through local Councils/Commissions

on Aging (COA) located throughout Region 9. Up to mid-November (the halfway point), Region 9's counselors have saved 1,526 beneficiaries over \$1,960,646 in prescription drug costs. If beneficiaries do nothing and decide not to participate in Open Enrollment, they will keep their plan as long as they pay the monthly premium, but their copays could cost a lot more in 2024. Appointments can be made by calling your local COA or 800-803-7174.

Caregiver Resource Center

Great news! Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) across the state are developing Caregiver Resource Centers with a \$5 million allocation from the state's ARPA funding. NEMCSA's AAA has been awarded \$191,750.00 of that onetime funding to help support family caregivers in our service area. The AAA will do this by developing a fourweek Self-Care Module, a Support Group Network as well as a virtual Support Group, outreach, and enhancing already developed caregiver programs and services. Long Term Care Ombudsman Program


Have you ever wondered what Region 9 AAA's Long Term Care Ombudsman does? The Ombudsman strives to improve the quality of care and quality of life experienced

NEW CLASSROOM OPENS

LOCATION: Herron, MI



As school districts stretch and grow, Head Start sometimes finds itself without classroom space. When this happened in the area west of Alpena, many hands helped create a new space for our community's children. After looking at every possible option, NEMCSA Head Start partnered with a local small business owner to rent and renovate space to make it a welcoming environment for preschoolers.

Many people and many hours of work are involved in an undertaking like this. Lisa Fluharty, Area Manager, states, "Thank you to everyone who helped my team through this process." This site is fully staffed and even has a Foster Grandparent!

In the photo, you see staff in the process of setting up the classroom, planning, and preparing for licensing, and their first day with children.

Finding licensable space is one of the barriers Head Start expects to continue to face in the coming years, but our innovative and hardworking staff to rise to the challenge.

- In Michigan, 21,863 children attend Head Start, and 7,020 children are enrolled in Early Head Start.
- Classroom staff are highly qualified and receive many hours of training every year.
- Children who attend Head Start demonstrate marked academic and social progress and are more likely to enter kindergarten ready to learn.

Head Start was created in 1965 by Lyndon B. Johnson. We are 58 years old!



- Head Start & Early Head Start services are provided at NO CHARGE to those who qualify.
- Head Start children have a higher likelihood of graduating high school, attending college, and receiving a postsecondary degree, license, or certification.

Program Impact BRIDGES OF SELF-SUFFICIENCY SUCCESS STORY

Sharing a heartening success story from the BOSS (Bridges of Self-Sufficiency) program that truly underscores the transformative impact staff are making in the lives of individuals. Susan, one of the program participants, has achieved a significant milestone on her journey toward self-sufficiency. Susan has not only taken charge of managing all her bills, including rent, but she has also demonstrated remarkable financial empowerment under the guidance of her new mentor, Amanda Bergeron. Amanda conducted a thorough budget review, uncovering opportunities for substantial savings. Through Amanda's assistance.



Susan identified a potential \$70 in savings by switching her car insurance provider and an additional \$50 by making the strategic decision to eliminate her cable bill. Susan also successfully applied for an internet stipend. As a result, Susan is on track to transition from having approximately \$40 left over every month to an impressive surplus of almost \$200 in her budget. To further fortify Susan's financial stability, Amanda and Susan explored budget plans for both her electric and gas bills. This strategic approach aligns with the commitment to not only address immediate needs but to empower participants with tools for sustained financial well-being. Susan's journey extends beyond financial stability. She is gaining confidence and embracing a newfound sense of security after overcoming the challenges of chronic homelessness and hopelessness. Amanda, in her mentorship role, has introduced practices such as gratitude exercises, mindfulness techniques, and positive affirmations to support Susan's overall mindset shift. This success story is a testament to the dedication of the mentors, the effectiveness of the program, and the tangible impact staff are making in the lives of those served. It exemplifies the positive ripple effects that extend far beyond the immediate financial realm, touching on the emotional and psychological well-being of participants. As Susan's achievements are celebrated, it renews staff commitment to providing the support and resources needed to empower more individuals on their paths to self-sufficiency.

MPOWERMENT

In the month of November, NEMCSA had **4 new households** sign up to participate in the **Family Self-Sufficiency Program**. These households will meet with staff quarterly to set and reach housing goals for the next 5 years while growing to financially support their households. In November, MSHDA completed an audit for the FSS program that consisted of reviewing client files to make sure they met HUD standards for the program. The program audit passed with flying colors and mention from MSHDA staff on NEMCSA staff organization and efficiency with running the program across the 12 counties.

A HUGE congratulations goes out to Cheryl Laban for passing her handwritten BPI EA Exam! Keep up the GREAT work that you do. Cheryl!

Here is what she had to say.

"I obtained my MI State Energy Auditor certification in January 2023, but the DOE requires BPI certification to continue in Weatherization. After meeting all BPI prerequisites, there are 2 types of exams that must be passed to become a certified BPI HEP Energy Auditor: a written exam and a field test. It was a great relief to pass the written exam part. I had heard it was difficult to pass and to not worry if I didn't pass the first time – I did! I still need to take the Field Test portion which I plan on doing in December.

I have built a good base of knowledge with the help of everyone on the Weatherization Team and many classes through MiTEC. I have studied many hours in prep for each exam and I learn from every house I audit. It's a continual thing – I need to learn constantly because every house is different, and every house needs its own solutions.

I'm excited to continue working in the Weatherization Program. We are making a big difference in many people's lives and it's a great feeling knowing they are warmer in winter and saving energy"–
