Program Impact AREA AGENCY ON AGING





Region 9 Area Agency on Aging (AAA) was awarded the 2023 Community-Based Dementia Mini-Grant offered by the Michigan Public Health Institute. The purpose of the grant is to expand its ongoing project by purchasing "mailers" to correspond with three Dementia webinars currently offered by the AAA. The mailers will be boxes filled with items corresponding to the webinar. For example, the Brain Health Mailer will include puzzle books, a hands-on craft, a recipe book, and a "Vial of Life" Lifesaving Kit. Each event participant will receive a corresponding mailer for the webinar they attended. Another innovative aspect of the grant will be the use of the Alzheimer's Foundation of America's "Dementia Experience" using a virtual reality (VR) headset. This will allow caregivers to better understand what someone living with Alzheimer's may be going through. The experience provides a three-dimensional, 36o-degree view with sound, while participants enter the world of "Sally," a person living with Alzheimer's. Through the experience, caregivers will witness common symptoms associated with the disease. The AAA plans to bring a demonstration of the units to a future NEMCSA Board meeting. Two of the three dementia webinars have occurred, but there is still time to join in the last session and receive not only education on dementia stress, but also receive a mailer.

Details are below:

August 11, 2023: Coping with Dementia Care Stress: Examine ways to cope with the daily stress of caregiving for someone with dementia. While exploring a self-paced virtual Caregiver resource—Trualta, which is an online caregiver resource platform, will be explored during the webinar. Trualta focuses on reducing caregiver burden while improving caregiver self-care, and confidence through virtual trainings that help build the skills necessary to provide care at home (Caregiver Self-Care Mailer).

Access to Trualta is the result of a joint project by the MSU School of Social Work and Region 9 AAA through a grant from the Michigan Health Endowment Fund.

Lender Partnerships & Prepurchase Counseling

Staff have been working in recent months to continue to build relationships with different lenders within our communities. So far staff have established strong affiliations with Nicolet Bank and Huntington Bank. These associations were established to benefit future homeowners that are working with the banks so that they can go into the home buying process fully knowledgeable as well as knowing how to understand all the different mortgage documents. Homebuyers meet with staff to complete Homebuyer Education, which walks through the entire process of becoming a homeowner and then they meet one on one with one of NEMCSA's

HUD Housing Counselors to create a budget, discuss individual issues, and determine how much they can reasonably afford given their other expenses.

Since staff started offering Prepurchase Counseling in the fall of 2022, 15 households have participated in counseling. All 15 households have gone on to successfully become homeowners while 80% of the counseling participants have been referred by our lending partners.



Homeowners that have fallen behind are able to apply for assistance with the following items:

Huntington National Bank Partners with NEMCSA Emergency Food Programs to support Golden Grocery Giveaway Program



SENIOR COMPANION & FOSTER GRANDPARENT PROGRAMS

"I really enjoyed speaking with them about the scams that are out there targeting older folks, what to watch out for, and how to protect themselves from such fraud. "



Every July, NEMCSA reports on the progress in meeting grant requirements and share information about the Foster Grandparent and Senior Companion programs. During the July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023 program year, 28 Foster Grandparents mentored and tutored 128 students. Of the 128 students, 61 demonstrated improved academic performance and 43 improved their academic engagement or social-emotional skills. Twenty-two Senior Companions provided companionship to 128 frail or chronically ill older adults and 122 reported having increased social support. During the process of collecting the above data, program partners were asked to share the impact of the volunteers.

The Weatherization Team was able to reach its State DOE production goal of 58 units completed for this past program year 7/1/22 to 6/30/23 and were able to spend out funding. NEMCSA's total production for that time period was 80 units (BIL, LIHEAP, and DOE Formula). Staff is proud to announce the department has worked tirelessly to get the daunting 1-year waitlist down to 6 months, getting services out much faster to clients than has been done in the past.


EMPLOYEE SPOTLIGHT
