



ANNUAL REVENUE

In FY 2024, NEMCSA's total funding reached \$67,891,770, supporting programs that empower individuals and families across northeast Michigan.




The Federal Share provided \$41,069,192 (60.49%), driving essential programs like early childhood education, senior services, and housing support. In addition, \$3,368,402 In-Kind contributions extended the impact of federal dollars.

The State Share and Various Contracts totaled \$23,454,176 (34.55%), funding key services such as weatherization and senior support. Local and In-kind Share contributions reached \$3,368,402 (4.96%), highlighting strong community partnerships.

ANNUAL EXPENDITURES

NEMCSA invested in programs that support individuals and families across northeast Michigan.



NEMCSA dedicated \$35.5M for Early Childhood Services, fostering family success, and \$15.1M for Community-Based Care, supporting seniors and adults with disabilities. Community Programs received \$5.9M, Aging Services \$4.5M, and Youth Services \$3M. Volunteer Programs, Community Development, and operations totaled \$3.8M. These funds empower people, strengthen communities, and create lasting change.

PROGRAM IMPACT

The Power of Mentoring - NEMCSA's Bridges of Self-Sufficiency (BOSS) Program

"Never give up!" These words have been Georgina's guiding mantra since she embarked on her journey with the BOSS Program. Georgina has been steadily making strides toward her goal of securing housing for her family. Recently, she was accepted into the Kalitta Apprenticeship Aviation Training Program! She didn't just get in; Georgina passed all her entrance exams and is now diving into the world of aviation history and mechanics. Upon program completion, she'll earn her certification in airframe and power plant - a testament to her dedication and hard work.



INITIATIVES

NEMCSA advanced its mission of empowering people and strengthening communities through several impactful initiatives, many of which were achieved through strategic partnerships.



Highlights of the year included:

<u>Childcare Innovation Initiative:</u> Partnering with the Quad County Childcare Coalition and Develop Iosco, NEMCSA conducted a study identifying childcare needs across four counties and provided six recommendations to improve access.

<u>PACE Northeast Michigan:</u> Set to open in 2025, this program will deliver vital healthcare and social services to older adults, addressing a critical senior care gap.

<u>Water Assistance Program:</u> NEMCSA aided residents in accessing affordable water services, reducing financial strain and enhancing quality of life.

<u>BOSS Program Expansion:</u> The BOSS Program expanded, adding staff and resources to strengthen case management and poverty education, empowering more families toward self-sufficiency.

<u>CSBG Direct Services Initiatives:</u> CSBG funding supported programs like auto repair assistance and back property tax relief, helping families achieve stability and maintain essential resources.













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A Place to Call Home: The Impact of NEMCSA's MIChoice Waiver Program

When Sarah faced eviction from her assisted living facility after seven years due to depleted savings, NEMCSA's MIChoice Waiver Program stepped in to cover her care costs. This ensured Sarah could stay in the place she called home, bringing relief to her family. Programs like MIChoice are vital for helping community members thrive by providing stability, dignity, and essential support when it's needed most.
