"I appreciate this event, especially the COVID vaccine opportunity. Everyone was so helpful and kind."



The Food Program has been busy working with our grant writer, Tracey Wood. We have submitted for two new funding opportunities that would allow us to grow our food programs by bringing fresh produce to three pilot counties, establishing a pantry, mobile delivery program and potentially 24/7 food locker access.

In addition, May is a busy month for the Food Program. We have both CSFP & TEFAP distributions running, along with 2nd chance pick up at our Ossineke Office/Warehouse location.

State of Michigan Deferral Reduction Funds Making a Difference in Northeast Michigan



The home pictured above was a going to be deferral in the Weatherization Program due to the condition of the flat roof. Thanks to the influx of these specialized funds our program has replaced the entire roof system and added insulation to a home that would not be able to have attic insulation without these funds. Now the Weatherization process can move forward and make this home more energy efficient and in the end save this client money each and every month moving forward. This was our first home to take advantage of the deferral reduction program and it was a perfect example of the impact it can make.

Details are being released for the upcoming expansion in the Weatherization Program. With the passage of the Infrastructure Legislation a sizable increase in the Weatherization budget at the Federal level will translate into a tripling of our local program funding. We are in the process of ramping up our production capacity. With this in our future we have added another Weatherization Inspector to our staff. We are proud to welcome Cheryl Laban into that position and she will hit the ground running May 2nd.





Homeless Prevention Services

Homeless, hungry and freezing. Read the story below to find out how NEMCSA changed his life.



John (Alpena): When his caseworker Ashley started working with him, he was living in an uninsulated garage using a pellet stove for heat. He had no income and could not always get pellets donated. There were many weeks this winter he went without heat. After 7 months of being in that garage, Ashley found him a home and his landlord hired him for work! John called his NEMCSA case worker on his way home from work and said "Wow, I can't believe I actually get to go home tonight! I have not been excited to head home in a very long time and be able to be warm!"

After living at the homeless shelter for six months with no income or family support, Nathan has moved into his own apartment and gained employment. When Nathan moved in, he had no household items. His caseworker, Ashley Smart, got him Goodwill vouchers and a basket of supplies from The Kindness Closet, With Nathan beginning his new employment, his case worker arranged for budget counseling with our Financial Coach to work through barriers and ensure Nathan always has a house to come home to.

Over this past year we have been able to place and keep over 1,000 people in their homes!

Our FGP and SCP volunteers are active community members and often act as conduits of program information to friends and family throughout the area. Furthermore, by sharing information across programs that may benefit a volunteer or their circle of influence, we are better able to serve the purpose of AmeriCorps Seniors by removing barriers to service and better enable our low-income seniors to serve as volunteers.

Kevin became a Senior Companion the spring of 2018 and soon started to notice his depression and anxiety began fading away. Kevin had no idea he could make a difference for someone else or that they, in turn, would have such a positive impact on him. He considers volunteering "a no brainer and not just something I want to do but must do... it makes perfect sense to improve upon oneself by serving others".
