

This work and collaboration began in July of 2022 and we are proud to share as of January 3, 2023 we assisted NWCAA in the hiring and training of four new staff and the program is up and running in TCAPS. NEMCSA will remain the lead on this project and will advocate and house all state funding that is earmarked for this new partnership.

On December 19th and 20th the new TCAPS/NWCAA staff came over to Alpena and shadowed our NEMCSA School Success Liaisons. This two- day training consisted of learning how to implement groups, student individual work, truancy processes, data collection and so much more. Weatherization

PROGRAM IMPACT

The NEMCSA Weatherization Team is continuing work into the New Year. We are progressing towards spending out Department of Energy formula funds with a total of 58 homes completed and will start focusing on the first batch of the BIL (Bi-Partisan Infrastructure Legislation) homes. This funding will help expand the program over the next five years and it begins right now with about 60 more homes to complete before 9/30/2023. This will be a challenge as we struggle with finding homes that are in suitable condition for weatherization to happen. We have been able to utilize some different types of funding to address these issues and make the homes ready for weatherization. NEMCSA has had good success with the funds, but it does slow the production cycle. We believe this will continue to be a challenge moving forward and hope to continue to find new streams of funding to support the efforts to make the homes ready for our program.

The new Weatherization Inspector, Cheryl Laban, is well on her way to securing an important certification from the State of Michigan that will allow her to complete her training while producing Energy Audits for the program. A great step for her, Congrats Cheryl!

& why we need them



Why are Homes Important?

Americans spend 90% of their time indoors, which means they are extremely influenced by these indoor environments. The air quality, water quality, and infrastructure of the home all can have important health implications. The health of our homes is indicative of our own health.

Air Quality

Second-hand smoke, carbon monoxide, dust mites, cockroach and mouse allergens, and mold are all aspects that limit a home's indoor air quality.

Lead

Lead is a highly toxic metal known to damage the brain and other vital organs that used to be used in paint for homes. Many homes still find traces of it inside.

Fire Safety

Installing smoke detectors, setting up an escape plan in the case of an emergency, and properly storing candles and lighters greatly improves the safety of a home.

Drinking Water

Bacteria and viruses, nitrate, lead, and copper, and pesticides can all commonly contaminate a home's water supply.

Healthy are homes are specifically important for children.

Their brains and bodies are still developing.

For their size, children breathe **twice** as much air as adults.

They also drink more water and eat more food.



Any harmful substance they ingest, they will receive in a higher dosage and will have a harder time fighting off.

Food Programs

Happy 2023! The NEMCSA Food Program's has re-branded both of their programs. The Food Boost program is what we formally call TEFAP and The Golden Grocery Giveaway is what we formally call CSFP. The purpose of the re-branding is to remove confusion from the formal names, offer clearer language in the new names that also is empowering.

Effective January 1, 2023 The Food Boost Program is now completely in house. The food is delivered directly to our warehouse in Ossineke and the food is now being sent out in two different ways. First, the Food Boost items are going out monthly (2-4 items) with the Golden Grocery Giveaway to allow for seniors to receive more food in their monthly boxes and to remove four additional unnecessary distributions a year! The remaining items are going out to pantries across the NEMCSA service area.

Area Agency on Aging (AAA)

Region 9 Area Agency on Aging has been notified that its team of 32 counselors is the recipient of the State Health Insurance Program (SHIP) Navigator Award for the third quarter of the 2022-23 SHIP grant year. October 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.

The Navigator Award recognizes the MMAP team that served the highest percentage of its Medicare population in a guarter as measured by Total Client Contacts reported in SHIPTools. Congratulations and thank you to the staff and volunteers who contributed to achieving the award.

Health Tip: Glaucoma is a group of diseases that damage the eye's optic nerve and can result in vision loss and even blindness. Some forms of glaucoma don't have any symptoms, so you may have the disease even if you don't have any trouble seeing or feel any pain. Half of people with glaucoma don't know they have it. If you get a glaucoma test and start treatment early, you may protect your eyes from serious vision loss. Medicare covers a glaucoma screening once every 12 months if you're at high risk for developing glaucoma.

If you have one of these conditions, then you're considered at high risk for developing glaucoma:

- You have diabetes
- · You have a family history of glaucoma
- You're African American and age 50 or older
- You're Hispanic and age 65 or older
