

Objectives Examples

Objectives should be written using the SMART model. SMART stands for:

Specific, Measurable, Achievable/Agreeable, Realistic/Relevant, Time-bound

Kinship

Example 1: The objective of the program is to provide limited funding to assist the senior caregiver in providing essentials, as well as life experiences for the child's care.

Example 2: The objective of the Kinship Grandparent Funds project is to provide financial support to 15 grandparents (households) who are raising related children who are 18 years old or younger by Sept. 30, 2023. This will be measured by documenting the number of funding requests that are approved and maintaining a file with copies of all program applications, and receipts showing purchase of requested items.

Objectives are precise and explain in detail what you will do and how you will measure it.

During Fiscal Year 2023, 107 homebound persons will receive home delivered meals. This will be tracked through NAPIS to determine the number of people who receive the meals.

The impact (outcome) is the expected result of the objective (what you did).

As a result of the home delivered meals, homebound persons will increase food security and have a regular source of appropriate nutrition, enabling them to continue living independently. The home delivered meal drivers also provide a social connection for participants who are often socially and/or geographically isolated.
